

This list is only for blades. (It doesn't include the quest's blades)

Early Explorers : (26 items)

Badelaire (blade3) FRANCE

A French butcher's favorite toy. Combat qualities are mediocre at best, but this heavy sabre is perfectly suited for dressing meat.

Maltese knight sword (blade8) SPAIN

A sword used by the Knights of Malta. As straight and grave as the knights themselves.

Arabic Scimitar (blade12) PIRATE

A broad sabre from the hot forges of Damascus. Light and sharp despite it's impressive size, this blade can easily cut silk and nails alike.

Spanish Nobility Longsword (blade14) SPAIN

A beautiful blade, of the type presented to those who are given Spanish titles of nobility. Legend claims that this kind of sword once was used by Cortés and his officers.

Iberian Longsword (blade15) SPAIN

This type of weapon was favored by early Spanish and Portuguese explorers.

Tizona (blade16) SPAIN

Swords of this type are mostly favoured by the Spaniards. Sometimes known as Toledo longswords.

Flamigera (blade17) HOLLAND

A dueling sword with a serpentine blade, reminiscent of a German flamberge, although somewhat lighter.

Asiatic Broadsword (blade20) PORTUGAL

An Asiatic weapon of uncertain origin, possibly Chinese.

Falchion (blade21) ENGLAND

A heavy sword perfectly suited for cutting your foe into neat little slices.

Corsair's Pride (blade22) ENGLAND

Swords like this were awarded to corsairs in service of Her Majesty, for great service to Britain, usually upon their being knighted.

Dutch Admiralty Sword (blade23) HOLLAND

An inscribed blade presented to captains of the Dutch Navy.

French Nobility Sword (blade25) FRANCE

Blade presented to those who are knighted for their service to France.

Portuguese Officer's Sword (blade29) PORTUGAL

Decorative sword presented to high-ranking naval officers of Portugal. This model is based on the first blades used by the great Portuguese explorer Vasco da Gama.

Back-bladed Sidesword (bladec2) SPAIN

This is a quarter hilt Venetian sword. Two distinct aspects to this design are the steel grip and a wide back-blade with double fullers down the spine. The single-edged blade is heavy and broad enough to justify classifying it as a side sword.

Falchion (bladec10) PORTUGAL

A short blade, decorated with an ivory head under the handle.

Katzbalger (bladec12) ENGLAND

A Double-edged blade with three large and two small fullers, s-shaped quillions with ball finials, flared fungus-shaped pommel merging flush into wooden grip.

Shellcup Falchion (bladec18) PIRATE

This heavy sword is mostly used by strong men, who have enough man power to cut their opponents in tiny pieces!

Knights Templar Sword (blade?) SPAIN

This ancient, double-edged broadsword has been handed down through the generations by the 'Guardians of the Holy Grail'. The weapon bears the inscription "In hoc signo vinces" - "With this sign, thou shall be victorious".

Hunting Sword (blade?) PIRATE

This short, sharp sword is used for slaughtering animals, but is just as effective against people.

Kilij (blade?) PIRATE

An ancient, heavy, single-edged Sabre from the Ottoman Empire.

Crab Claw BroadSword (blade?) ENGLAND

Ancient, heavy double-edged weapon. Can cause significant damage, if you can get you opponent to move slow enough.

Longsword (blade?) ENGLAND

Ancient but effective double-edged weapon. Striking true with this heavy blade can cause emense damage.

Tizona (second version) (blade?) SPAIN

Legendary, ancient, double-edged Spanish broadsword made from Damascus steel, which is said to give the wielder magical powers. The weapon bears the inscription "Hail Mary, full of grace. The Lord is with you".

Borgiablade (bladeX1) SPAIN

Looks like a flashy ceremonial blade, but the tip is poisoned with Belladonna. Even the slightest scratch will cause the victim's slow but certain death.

Dragon's Head (blade34) PIRATE

A gift from the pirate lords. A rare treasure, as pirates are not known for giving things away.

Gold and Jewel Encrusted Dagger (blade?) PORTUGAL (To SIM : this is a blade not a dagger.)

This long gold dagger is encrusted with precious jewels and has probably seen more ceremonies than battlefields. Seems a shame to get it dirty really.

Spanish Main : (26 items)

Rapier (blade2) FRANCE

"These weapons are fit for children, not for men, for straggling boys of the camp to murder poultry, not for men of honor to try the battle with their foes" - George Silver, "Paradoxes of Defence" 1599.

Schiavona (blade6) SPAIN

A graceful, deadly blade used by Italian mercenaries.

Yataghan (blade7) PIRATE

Few things cut better than a yataghan - it can split a whale in two. If you manage to sneak up on it.

French Admiralty Rapier (blade9) FRANCE

A fine rapier, a presentation from the French Crown.

Piranha (blade10) PIRATE

A bloodthirsty-looking short sword of fine steel. Not made for defense, but it's bite more than makes up for that.

Highlander (blade11) ENGLAND

This Scottish broadsword is a perfect match for a man with a fiery temper. A tad heavy, but in a strong hand it makes for a fearsome weapon.

Dueling Rapier (blade13) PORTUGAL

Lighter and faster than your basic rapier. A lot of work went into this design.

German Rapier (blade19) HOLLAND

A simple, yet effective rapier, apparently of German origin.

Solingen Rapier (blade26) HOLLAND

These fine blades were made in Solingen, Germany, specifically to be presented to Dutch nobility.

Shamshir (blade28) PORTUGAL

An ornamental Persian sword featuring a slim upcurved blade. The single edged blade is very sharp, but offers little defensive value.

Snake Head (blade31) PIRATE

A beautiful short sword perfect for a fledgling pirate.

Damascus Shamshir (blade32) PORTUGAL

An inlaid, engraved Persian sword made from the finest Damascus steel. This kind of blade has been spreading since the conquest of Goa to the Turks in the 16th century. A gift from the Portuguese Crown.

Moorish Saber (blade33) SPAIN

An Arabic saber with beautiful golden ornamentation. A gift from the Spanish Crown.

Milanese Rapier (bladec11) SPAIN

This later rapier did not just appear out of nowhere, however. There are many swords that bridge the gap between the cutting and thrusting styles; swords that are shorter than later rapiers, but more slender than the earlier cutting side swords.

Pappenheimer Rapier (bladec26) HOLLAND

This is a factory-created prototype of this sword. The double clam shell fits among the swirled hilt and is perforated with diamond cutouts and lined in red suede. Also featured are recurved quillions, faceted wire bound grip, and an mushroom-shaped pommel.

Swept Hilt Rapier (bladec30) SPAIN

Spanish Cup-Hilt Rapier (blade?) SPAIN

Light and well ballanced, the Spanish Cup-Hilt Rapier has a long, razor sharp foil blade ideal for dueling, but can be damaged easily.

Golden Age of Piracy : (26 items)

A pirate's best friend. This short and heavy sabre is perfectly suited for combat on a cramped deck

Bosun's Choice (blade27) PIRATE

Once Bosun Malcolm settled on a life ashore, he decided that someone should make good blades for Bosuns, for working sailors, not just fancy blades for officers. Magnificent cutlasses like this are the result of his effort.

Smallsword (bladec6) ENGLAND

The smallsword is the common dueling weapon, and it is not merely a side arm, but a part of a man's daily wardrobe.

Walloon Sword (bladec33) HOLLAND

The Walloon sword is favored by both the military and civilian gentry for its versatility: it was light, flexible, and good for both cutting and thrusting as well as the more accurate pointwork required in duels with rapiers.

Merchants Blade (MerchantsBlade) HOLLAND

This saber is favoured by the few merchants who want to protect their merchandise with their lives. Not very elegant, but it does its job.

Polish Hussar's Szabla (blade?) HOLLAND

Mêlée weapon widely used by the heavy Cavalry of the Polish Hussars. The long, thin, single-edged curved blade is ideal for skewering your opponent while on horse-back. This is the weapon that influenced the later adoption of Sabres into Western European Armies.

Wooden Handled Naval Dirk (blade?) ENGLAND

A Naval Officers best friend. Lighter and more compact than a traditional sword, the Dirk consists of a Dagger handle with a cut-down sword blade, making it ideal for deck fighting.

Bronze Handled Naval Dirk (blade?) ENGLAND

More of a Dress Sword than a combat weapon, with this Bronze Dirk you can impress the ladies and slaughter your enemies at the same time.

Gold Handled Naval Dirk (blade?) ENGLAND

A particularly ornate, gold Dirk, that would make a ideal gift for someone.....in between the ribs!

Venetian Navy Cutlass (blade?) PIRATE

Robust enough to hack through ropes, canvas and wood yet short enough to wield on a compact ship deck. This Cutlass is the weapon of choice for any self-respecting Pirate.

French Court Sword (blade?) FRANCE

Ornate Dress Sword from the Royal Courts of Paris. Maybe you can impress your opponent into submission.

Colonial Powers : (26 items)

Btw : Golden Age of Piracy's blades minus red blades.(blade 19,26,6,11)

Sabre (blade1) FRANCE

A common saber. Better designed for use from horseback than in a duel.

English Officer's Saber (blade24) ENGLAND

Sword presented to English Naval Officers upon their being given a major command.

Dueling Saber (blade30) FRANCE

A finely crafted Italian dueling saber. Blades such as this are rare in the archipelago.

Russian Cossack's Shashka (blade?) ENGLAND

The Shashka, meaning 'Long Knife', is favored by Russian Cossack regiments due to its light weight and durable blade. Being perfectly balanced, the Shashka is an ideal Cavalry weapon and is deadly in almost anybody's hands.

Revolutions : (26 items)

Btw : The Colonial Powers' blades+US Cavalry Sabre (blade?) UNITED STATES - Dragon's Head

Finely crafted Sabre of the US Cavalry. With it's long, durable, razor sharp single-edged blade, this sword surely is a weapon to behold.

The Corsican : (26 items)

Like the Revolutions' blades.

Question : The sabre only appears from the Colonial Powers. So, what blade for the soldiers before this period ?

Early Explorers : Falchion (blade21) ENGLAND or Katzbalger (bladec12) ENGLAND ?

Spanish Main : Rapier (blade2) FRANCE ?

Golden Age of Piracy : Smallsword (bladec6) ENGLAND or Walloon Sword (bladec33) HOLLAND or Sabre (blade1) FRANCE (if we put this blade in this period but is it historically correct ?) ?
